Thankyou for sharingthe Agent's response Mr Singlehurst's assessments a detailed and an interesting treatise for the Parish of Wolverley. The fundamental issuerests on the soundness of the WHI interpretation of ancient woodland, which if I understand correctly, was is based on a survey carried out by John Dayin 1983. The morphology of land enclosure within the site and its setting is consistent with a pattern of piecemeal encroachment into woodland and heath land typical of north Worcestershird and scapes and often resulting in the survival of long restablished woodland communities in the more marginal land parcels. Dating this process is, however, difficult because its origins reach back before the production of reliable maps. Therefore, returning to the WHI, it is a material evidence base that informs our advice and decision making, and its status as a reliable source extends beyond the threshold of national inventory classifications. However, do acknowledge that we cannot provide contextual documentation to further support the ancient woodland interpretation. I have liaised with colleagues in our HER and Archive teams to check for sources that may not have been included in the Archaeologica DBA quite simple because they are more obscure in nature. I have shared the detailed results with Codyalong with my interpretation (assummarise there), and conclude that we can demonstrate woodland coverwas established oear lier than the early 19th century.

I have now looked into the Ancient Woodland question at Lea Castle, Wolverley, in some detail and this is an account of my findings.

First of all, the sitesidentified on the Worcestershire Habitat Inventory and Ancient Woodland Catalogues "Ancient Semi Natural Woodland" (ASNW) are as follows:

WOLVERLEMODGE87023) is the name given to the woodland that curves around the west Worcesters hire

According to the DeskBasedArchaeologicaAssessmen previously prepared for this site, the earliest known map covering this area in detail is the 1838 Wolverley tithe map, the relevant extract from which is attached. Unfortunately, this map shows the plot boundaries and reference numbers, but does not clearly distinguish between woodland and grass and. Faint, blue grey outlines indicate which land was either woodland or pasture, with yellow outlines indicating a rable fields, but that's as far as it goes. All earlier mapping was not at a large enough scale to show such natural features as woodland or field/plot boundaries.
