Class Size

Our Published Admission Number (PAN), set by the Strees/Local Academy Board, is plear year group (Receptiont Year 6) giving a total di08overall for the whole school. The ustees/ Local Academy Board retain the right to amend the PAN for future yeals. The PAIsInly applies to the relevant age group. This means that admission authorities may not refuse admission to other age groups on the grounds that they have already reached their PAN. They may, however, refuse admission where the admission of another child would prejudice the provision of efficient education or efficient use of resources.

Admissions Criteria

Late Applications

The Trust has agreed in its co-ordinated scheme to accept late applications and treat them as being on time, if received by 28 February 202 only in the following ircumstances;

- a) where a family have just moved address, (refer to Information for Pabentklet);
- b) where it is agreed by the choolAdmissions, that individual circumstances apply and the delay was reasonable given the circumstances of transe;

In each case supporting documentary evidence will be required. In all other circumstances, or if the application is not received until aftene date set out in the scheme, late applications will receive a lower priority, and will only be considered after the applications received (or deemed to be) on time.

Waiting Lists
