I write in objection to the proposed quarry at Lea Castle Farm near Wolverley.

My name is Jill Aston and I am a horse owner, rider, instructor and trainer with more than 25years experience in the equine world. I am also the last person to have run a riding school at Lea Castle Equestrian Centre owned by Mr and Mrs McDonald.

My own personal horses are currently kept on livery at Lea Castle Equestrian Centre.

The peace and tranquility of the area provides home to my three horsean ex international show jumper, a competition horse and a children's pony.

The equestrian centre has been exactly that since its inset and has provided thousands of children and adults with the pleasure of equestrianism.

My own daughter is only 11 months old and because of the nature of the centre and surrounding bridle paths, I am able to take her out on her pony for hacks knowing that we have a large visual area to prepare for any potential hazards but also to enjoy the bird song, the weather and the safety of these paths. My 7 year old niece has learned to ride at the centre on our pony and can often be found riding solo up and down the bridle paths with us adults tagging along at a distance knowing she is always within our view and watching her embrace the outdoors on her best friend and noble steed.

I beg you to consider the young and less experienced equestrians using these bridle paths and the potential impact that the changes in the area would have upon them should the quarry go ahead. They will no longer be able to enjoy these paths safely for fear of rolling conveyor belts beneath their pony's feet, HGVs that could upset their beloved friend and not to mention the dark dusty tunnels the bridle paths will become with the new bund structures in place.

The indoor school at Lea Castle Equestrian Centre enables both novice riders and horses the ability to begin their ridden career in a quiet and safe environment where they can take time to adjust and learn their new skillsthis will no longer be a quiet safe space with a quarry rumbling less than 100m away.
